

The Seminar for Contemporary Studies of Freud and Lacan opens a 2-year course in 2025 - 2026 'The Four Fundamental Concepts of Psychoanalysis and the Real (Réel) Unconscious'

Argument

... in avoiding the **I think**, I avoid the discussion that results from the fact that this **I think**, for us, certainly cannot be detached from the fact that he can formulate it only by **saying** it to us, implicitly – a fact that he forgets...

In a precisely similar way, Freud, when he doubts – for they are his dreams, and it is he who, at the outset, doubts - is assured that a thought is there, which is unconscious, which means that it reveals itself as absent. As soon as he comes to deal with others, it is to this place that he summons the **I think** through which the subject will reveal himself. In short, he is sure that this thought is there alone with all his **I am**, If I may put it like this, provided, and this is the leap, someone thinks in his place.

Lacan, Seminar XI, lesson of 29 January 1964

Colette Soler comments on the above dissymmetry between Freud and Descartes regarding certainty. The discovery of psychoanalysis shows that this certainty is not found in the subject of thought. It is the Other or the psychoanalyst that is responsible for underpinning the presence of the unconscious. For Lacan the subject of the unconscious manifests itself or thinks before it attains certainty. In some sense we here have a Freudian subversion of Descartes' subject – the subject of thought, self-consciousness and mastery. The subject of the unconscious thought presents himself rather as a slave submitted to the effects of language. It is a subject subverted by the world of signifiers.

Lacan's trajectory leads beyond this. This is why Seminar XI can be viewed as one of a (final) breaking points, not only from the Société Française de Psychanalyse, but also from Freud himself. However, this was not to make Lacan's pathway as anti-Freudian but rather as moving beyond Freud, and in a way with Freud himself. Jacques-Alain Miller suggested to call the Freudian unconscious the transferential one. It presupposes a link between S1 and S2. Lacan comes to discover the instance where this transferential connection is no longer operative. In the Preface to English-Language Edition of Seminar XI he writes the following: 'When the space of a lapsus no longer carries any meaning (or interpretation), only then is one sure that one is in the unconscious'. In this space of a lapsus one is sure - one as self all alone, that knows. This does not happen in the register of intersubjectivity nor that of inter-significance, between S1 and S2. There is no 'friendship' there to support this (transferential unconscious). It is there where Lacan finally states: 'The unconscious is not what one thinks it is, I say: the unconscious is real, if you take my word for it'.

This year we will try undertaking a fascinating line of research, beginning from Freud, 'the incontestable theoretician of the unconscious', proceeding with Lacan, through a close reading of one of his central and perhaps most important seminars, and relying on illuminating contributions by Jacques-Alain Miller and Colette Soler, eventually to get as close as possible to grasping the 'notion' of the unconscious as real.
